### The Building of the Welland Canals - Moving ships over the Niagara Escarpment with ROBERT WILLIAMSON



Commander **Robert Williamson**, BA, B Ed, CD (Canadian Forces Decoration and clasp for almost 30 years of service to the Canadian Naval Reserve) received an Honours Degree in Geography from McMaster University in 1962. He is a retired Secondary School Principal and former Commanding Officer of Hamilton's Naval Reserve, HMCS Star. During his appointment his ship was awarded the most improved Naval Division in Canada.

Presently, he is Past Chairman of the Hamilton Mountain Heritage Society and Chairman of the Board of Governors for the Hamilton Division of the Canadian Corps of Commissionaires. He is a member of the Hamilton Historical Board and the Board of Education Archives. A major contributor to local history, he has written, co-authored or been a contributing author to 13 heritage books and prepared 40 different slide-illustrated historical talks. As a member of the Board of Education's Speaker's Bureau, he has made over 800 guest appearances locally and internationally to speak about Canadian heritage. As a guide he has conducted many

local heritage walking and bus tours and prepared the wording for seven City of Hamilton heritage plaques.

For his contribution to the research and promotion of Canadian history as well as volunteer service to his community, Bob Williamson has received numerous prestigious awards.

**John Novak** is a Fine Art Photographer and a Wildfowl and Bird Carver who lives in Brantford, Ontario. John's interest in carving wildfowl and songbirds initially rekindled his photography interests, which had been dormant since high-school, as a way to acquire reference material for his carvings. John's photography has grown to include nature, landscape and still life subjects. He prides himself in capturing a unique view on nature using his knowledge of wildlife and their habitats gained from his many years of study in support of his carving interests.

John is also an active member of the Brantford Arts Block, The Canadian Association for Photographic Art, and both the Brant Camera Club and the Woodstock Camera Club.

Many of John's prints have received awards in photographic competitions at the Ward World Championship Wildlife Photography Competition in Ocean City, Maryland and the Paris Ontario Fair's Photography Competition. His prints have also received many awards in both club and inter-club competitions.

John has exhibited several of his prints as part of a group show at the Windjammer Inn, Port Stanley, Ontario (2007) and the The One London Place Judge Chair's Special" show at One London Place, London, Ontario (2008).

John's prints are personally made to the highest archival standards on an Epson Professional Imaging printer using Epson UltraChrome K3™ pigment inks and acid free papers. John's images are guaranteed to last a lifetime without fading or changing in colour.

## *Waterfalls along the Niagara Escarpment by Joseph Hollick*

### **Mother Nature Changes Albion Falls**

**Albion Falls** has had a long history dating back to 1792 when a grist mill was built beside the falls forming the basis of a small community during the next century. By early 1900 the small village called Albion Mills was in decline however Albion Falls still was featured on several postcards at that time. Today Albion Falls is the most spectacular waterfall in the east end of Hamilton having year round flow and easy accessibility due to parking lots and viewing platforms nearby.

Albion Falls is a "Complex Classic Cascade" waterfall located on the Red Hill Creek. Its height is listed as 19 metres (62 ft.) and its crest width is 18 m (59 ft.). However on July 26, 2009 Mother Nature unleashed her fury with a 100 year storm event that changed Albion Falls such that the waterfall appears deeper, possibly increasing its height (yet to be measured).

To reach Albion Falls, exit the LINC/Red Hill Valley Parkway at Dartnall Rd. Turn left onto Stone Church Rd., then turn left onto Pritchard Rd., then left onto Mountain Brow Blvd. Albion Falls is located at the first bridge. Parking lots are available on the left side just before the bridge and on the right side just past the bridge.

The attached three photos depict Albion Falls:

First as it was in 1895 courtesy of the Hamilton Public Library Special Collections Dept. The water on the left side flows down the spillway coming from the mill.

Second as it was in March 2009 (prior to the storm)

Third as it is today (August 2009) after the storm.



Note the differences between photos 2 and 3 that Mother Nature created:

There are now two ledges part way up, whereas before the storm there was only one. A section of this ledge on the right side washed out to create the second lower ledge. The rock slabs from it are lying on the bottom right.

On the bottom left, all previous rocks have been washed downstream, actually making the waterfall deeper and exposing the shale (red and grey layered rock), whereas before the storm this area was a pond surrounded by large rocks and no shale was visible.
