# Trails along the Niagara Escarpment utilized in the War of 1812

with John Bryden – former journalist, MP 1993-2004, Historian, Author and Researcher

Born in Dundas, **John Bryden** grew up there and went to McMaster University, graduating in English and History and went on to complete a Masters of Philosophy at the University of Leeds in England. He began his career in journalism as a reporter for the *Hamilton Spectator*, went on to *The Globe and Mail* and then to the *Toronto Star* where he served as features editor, business editor and senior news editor.

He struck out on his own to write books and is author of "Deadly Allies: Canada's Secret War", dealing with Canada's role in the development of chemical and biological warfare weapons during the Second World War, and "Best Kept Secret", discussing Canada's role in code and cipher breaking. John was also the Member of Parliament for the federal riding of Dundas-Ancaster- Flamborough- Aldershot from 1993 to 2004.

He has had a long interest in the early history of the Dundas Valley and, in the course of his research for his next book, ran into some fascinating maps of the region in the National Archives in Britain.

Danuta currently, lives, works and creates in her home studio in Dundas, Ontario. She has a growing watercolour collection of historical buildings located there.


#### **Artistic Statement:**

On Sunday, February 19<sup>th</sup>, Danuta's daughter, Kasia Niton, an established artist herself, will be on hand for some face-painting for the kids!



# The Literary Rib

#### The Great Lakes: The Natural History of a Changing Region

When I first approached this book for review, I was a little puzzled as to what "kind" of book it was. Its contents and high quality paper stock suggested a coffee table book. But the size (19cmx25cm) said "text book"! But, it doesn't read like a textbook. It's far more conversational in style and there are frequent diversions of thought.

The more time I spent with it, the better I liked it!

Despite my early uncertainty about "genre", the book does come with an impressive number of awards: Gold Medal from the Independent Publishers for regional non-fiction, National Outdoor Book Award and Silver Medal as *Foreward* Magazine's Book of the Year.

The author, Wayne Grady, was born in Windsor and now lives outside of Kingston so one could say he has the Great Lakes in his blood and his backyard! He has been editor of both *Harrowsmith* and *Equinox* magazines. The photographs, used throughout the book, (credits are given to a large number of sources) are outstanding! They are full colour, focussed, and very well chosen for their illustrative role. Throughout the book, there are full and half pages of what I would call "did you know" inserts. These are little

digressions, side bars or in-depth focuses on a particular subject – ie. "native thoughts on the origin of the whitefish", "the use of stormwater ponds in controlling urban runoff", "Bear facts in the Great Lakes Basin" and "The Oak Ridges Moraine". They in themselves make an interesting read!

The book is organized in 9 chapters. The first is the "overview" - the "What and Where" of the Great Lakes and the lands that surround them. Grady introduces the concept of "ecoregion" and maps the eight eco-regions which surround the Great Lakes basin. Chapter 2 is the "Why and How" of the formation of the Great Lakes basin. The reporting is detailed enough for the science expert yet approachable enough for the novice. The next three chapters examine in turn, each of three forest types identified in the basin – Boreal, Great-Lakes St. Lawrence and Carolinian. It is here that my only quibble arises.

After spending quite some time describing *eco-regions* and flora and fauna associated with each in Chapter 2, Grady now switches the unit of analysis to *forest types* (each of which

include parts of several eco-regions. To the lay person, this inconsistency could be confusing, and to me, renders the eco-region concept less meaningful.

The remaining 4 chapter deal with what the author calls "marginal" habitats (marshlands, urban forests and alvars), life in and on the Lakes themselves and the problems of pollution and invasive species, and the future of the Great Lakes – "what (they) might be like a century from now if all the mistakes of the past are at least halted if not corrected". I saw this as a refreshingly optimistic view of what is too easily seen as "going to hell in a basket".

The final pages include a substantial list of references for further reading, four pages of scientific names for Great Lakes flora and fauna, and a comprehensive index.

In his closing paragraph, Grady quotes David Dempsey, author of *On the Brink: The Great Lakes in the 21<sup>st</sup>Century*. Dempsey is encouraged by the public's growing engagement with the Great Lakes. If there is good news, Dempsey says "it's the slowly rising tide of consciousness".

Wayne Grady, in this work, has done an admirable job of contributing to this "rising tide".


# Waterfalls along the Niagara Escarpment

**Little Davis Falls** is located on Davis Creek, a tributary of the Red Hill Creek, in east Hamilton, on public lands owned by the City of Hamilton. With it being located downstream of Felker's Falls, it sometimes is referred to as Lower Felker's Falls.

Little Davis Falls is considered a Terraced or Twin Curtain Falls with a height of 3m (10 ft.) and a width of 8m (26 ft.). It has flow year round however heaviest flow is after a rainfall or during the winter snow melt as seen in the attached photo.

To reach this waterfall from the Red Hill Valley Parkway, take the Greenhill Ave. exit and travel east to Quigley Rd. Turn right, or south, and follow Quigley Rd. to the end. Park on the adjoining street, Hildegard Dr. Walk back to the end of Quigley Rd. and follow the access/grass area towards the escarpment. As the grass area widens out past several bushes, turn right and walk about 25m to Davis Creek and Little Davis Falls.

## Teachers' Corner

The Giant's Rib Discovery Centre (GRDC) has distributed to teachers, upon request, within the Hamilton and Halton Regions, the Grade 4 Rocks and Minerals Unit of Work.

Teachers using this Unit of Work have been very pleased to receive it and have found their students enjoying the guided learning process. It was the goal of the GRDC to offer these materials to teachers throughout Ontario, especially to those teaching in schools relatively close to the Niagara Escarpment. However, to date, the shipping costs have prohibited the GRDC from doing that.

To help solve this problem, the Niagara Escarpment Commission has offered to place the print materials for the Rocks and Minerals Unit on their web-site and the TD Friends of the Environment (Hamilton Branch) have given the GRDC a grant to distribute the related CDs of Quick Time Movies to teachers who wish to teach this Unit of Work.

The Hamilton Branch of the TD Friends of the Environment Foundation had given an original grant to the GRDC to print the materials and were quite willing to extend their support so that other teachers throughout the province could receive the Unit at no cost.

# The Niagara Escarpment World Biosphere Reserve

The Directors of the Giant's Rib Discovery Centre form a Committee of the Niagara Escarpment World Biosphere Reserve. Their basic responsibilities are directed to helping ensure that the Niagara Escarpment continues to meet the three basic criteria of a biosphere reserve:

- Contribute to conservation of landscapes, ecosystems, species and genetic variation;
- Foster economic and human development which is socio-culturally and ecologically sustainable;
- Provide support for research, monitoring, education and information exchange related to local national and global issues of conservation and development.

## The UNESCO Biosphere Reserve Designation

The biosphere is all of the land, water and atmosphere that support life. A biosphere reserve is an international designation of recognition from UNESCO (the United Nations Educational, Scientific, and Cultural Organization) for an area in the world which is deemed to demonstrate a "balanced relationship between humans and the biosphere".

By this is meant that collaborative efforts among people in the designated area serve to promote the sustainability of local economies and communities, as well as the conservation of the terrestrial/or coastal ecosystems they are in.
