## That's Amore: Opening your eyes to Hamilton's waterfall wonders

With Jon Wells, award-winning journalist and author



**Jon Wells** is an award-winning journalist and author with the Hamilton Spectator, where he writes primarily long features on subjects ranging from true crime to arts and the environment.

Jon started working for the Spectator in 1997, and over the years his work has won 15 Ontario Newspaper Awards and two National Newspaper Awards.

He has to date published seven books; five of these have been true crime, focusing on Hamilton homicide investigations. His book "Post-Mortem" was nominated for an Arthur Ellis Award.

His latest book is "Death's Shadow", published by Dundurn.

Jon has written features about Hamilton's natural wonders, including "Jon's Journey," a first-person account of his experiencing canoeing, biking, and hiking around Hamilton -- a story that won a Hamilton Tourism Award and an Ontario Newspaper Award.

Jon was born in Montreal, raised in London, Ont., attended the University of Western Ontario and then Carleton University in Ottawa, where he earned his Masters Journalism degree.



# Waterfalls along the Niagara Escarpment



**Princess Falls** has been known by other names such as Lang's Falls, Upper Princess Falls and Westerly Falls on Chedoke Radial Trail.

Princess Falls is located on Lang's Creek and is the uppermost waterfall of three falls situated on Lang's Creek in west Hamilton. It is considered a ribbon falls which includes an upper cascade portion and a lower plunge section. Its height is 7m and has a width of approximately 2m when flowing full, which however can be reduced to zero flow during dry periods.

Its Latitude and Longitude Coordinates are 43° 14' 45" N, 79° 55' 48" W.

To reach Princess Falls from Hwy 403, take the Linclon Alexander Parkway exit and then the first exit to Mohawk Road. Turn left onto Mohawk Road and proceed to Scenic Drive, where you turn left. In about 1.5 km, Scenic Drive makes a 90 degree turn to the right and immediately after this turn there is a small parking lot on the left side. Beside this parking lot look for the entrance to the Bruce Trail / Chedoke Radial Trail combination and follow it eastward for about five minutes to Princess Falls. You will notice that the water from Princess Falls flows under the Chedoke Radial Trail via culverts to the other side where it becomes Lower Princess Falls which is visible from Hwy 403.

## **Giant's Rib Discovery Centre receives grant from TD Friends of the Environment Foundation**

The Giant's Rib Discovery Centre (GRDC) has officially announced receipt of a \$10,000 grant from the TD Friends of the Environment

Foundation (TD FEF) last month. The grant will help fund improvement projects which include upgrades to the current Centre, upgrades and redevelopment of the GRDC website, and the development of a travelling educational display.

Volunteers and visitors will begin to see changes and improvements to the Centre and its resources over the next few months. New storage containers for fossil specimens have already been purchased and the GRDC has also acquired a new and rare fossil which will be announced and on display later this spring.

Since 1990, TD FEF has provided more than \$65 million in funding to more than 22,000 environmental projects across Canada. 



# Teachers' Corner

Over the next couple of months, many birds will return to the Niagara Escarpment Region after spending several months in the sunny south. Teachers might have their students spend a little time researching these birds so that they can identify them. Have them develop charts where they record first sightings, first signs of nest or home building, first indication of egg laying, and finally a count on the number of chicks that hatch from the nests.

The birds I have listed are song-birds and often are back-yard feeders. Teachers might like to add a few other birds that are common to their areas most of the year like robins and blue jays but also have their young in the Spring.

The birds listed can all be found in any of the Ontario bird books:

*The frozen finger pushes into the sediment and bores down into the lake basin. A researcher injects liquid nitrogen into the finger to freeze the sediment, and preserve the sample for examination. During careful analysis of the sediment, researchers discover corn pollen, but this corn pollen is hundreds of years old.*
