Waterfalls along the Niagara Escarpment by Joseph Hollick

Lower Tews Falls has been known for over a century as there is a vintage postcard dated 1906 showing it, however it was referred to as Hopkins Ravine at that time. The reason for this name is that the Hopkins family owned the land in 1906. About 1910 the Tews family acquired the property and now this small, but beautiful, waterfall is known as Lower Tews Falls.


Lower Tews Falls is a "Twin Curtain" waterfall with a total height of 3.7 metres (12 ft.) and a crest width of 6.7 m (22 ft.). It is located on Logie's Creek downstream of Tews Falls and just before it joins with Spencer Creek. The waterfall today looks similar as was depicted in the 1906 postcard however only one half of the twin waterfall is shown in the vintage postcard.

To reach Lower Tews Falls, the easiest way is to park on the east shoulder of Woodley Lane just off King St. (on the way to the Dundas Golf Club). Then walk along the shoulder of King St. under the railway bridge and up the former divieway to the former Dundas railway station. The third trail on the left side (past where the station used to be located) will take you to Lower Tews Falls without having to cross any creek. This waterfall is not widely known as it used to be difficult to reach it, however this trail is becoming well worn making access much easier.
