

Waterfalls along the Niagara Escarpment by Joseph Hollick

Devil's Punch Bowl, also known as Devil's Punchbowl Falls, Devil's Punchbowl and the Horseshoe Falls, is considered a ribbon type falls which is located on Stoney Creek in the community of Stoney Creek. It is the third highest waterfall in Hamilton with a height of 37m (121 ft.) and a width of 3m (10 ft.).

To reach the Devil's Punch Bowl from the QEW, take Centennial Parkway exit and follow this road to Ridge Road which is the first road at the top of the escarpment. Turn left onto Ridge Road and follow it to the Devil's Punch Bowl Conservation Area on the left side.

There are a number of stories as to how the Devil's Punch Bowl got its name. One story is the possibility that it was named for the home brew (devil) which was bootlegged in the surrounding woods. The punchbowl (and horseshoe) reflects the bowl-like shape of the rock formation.

A vintage postcard from 1906 (below, left) calls this waterfall the Horseshoe Falls (picture attached). What is interesting in this photo is the lady at the bottom left of the falls – she is wearing a dress to visit a waterfall



The second photo (above, middle) taken in spring 2008 shows this waterfall at full flow and gives a good comparison of this waterfall a century later.

A third photo (above, right) taken in winter 2004 shows that a cone of ice or ice volcano has formed around the waterfall as if sucking in the water and the ice is nearly 100 ft. high!

Rocks and Minerals of the Niagara Escarpment

Check out <u>www.mineralogicalassociation.ca/poster</u> to get a free poster on the Minerals of Canada. This poster has been designed for teachers and students exploring curricula related to rocks and minerals. With the poster you can explain several properties of minerals: luster, cleavage, colour, crystal form and iridescence.

Would you like to get a close look at the Niagara Escarpment Strata (rock layers) that formed during the geological Silurian Period? Visit the Royal Botanical Gardens Rock Chapel Sanctuary off Highway # 5 on Rock Chapel Road. There is a stairway down the Escarpment that is built close enough to the scarp face that you can touch the rock as you descend. Each layer of rock is identified and described.
