

Hamilton-Halton Watershed Stewardship Program

Jaime Overy is a Project Planner within the Planning and Engineering Department of the Hamilton Conservation Authority. She has been with the HCA for over five years, joining them as a Watershed Stewardship Technician, but is now co-ordinating the Healthy Hamilton Watersheds Action Plan – an initiative to establish a collaborative effort among all of the agencies and organizations in Hamilton to work toward improving and preserving the local natural environment. Jaime also represents the Hamilton Conservation Authority on a number of other initiatives including: ReLeaf Hamilton, the Waterfalls of Hamilton Inventory, Children's Water Festival and the Sharing Experiences workshop series.

She is a graduate of Trent University in Geography and has previously worked for the St. Clair Region Conservation Authority and the Ontario Ministry of the Environment in similar roles. Jaime is passionate about helping people and communities develop and utilize tools for sustainability as she continues to focus her career and efforts toward that goal.

For the past 19 years, **Sheila O'Neal** has been employed in the field of conservation. Since 2006, she has served as the Manager of the Hamilton-Halton Watershed Stewardship Program of the Hamilton and Halton Conservation Authorities.

Previously, Sheila worked as a Watershed Stewardship Technician, meeting with watershed landowners on their properties, providing recommendations for land management practices to improve water quality



and habitat. Prior to that, she worked as a Landowner Contact/Restoration Technician for Carolinian Canada, working with landowners in Beverly Swamp, Sassafras Woods and along the Grimsby-Winona Escarpment. A long-time member of the Hamilton Naturalists' Club and Bay Area Restoration Council, she graduated from Sir Sandford Fleming College as a Fish and Wildlife Technician.

Sheila is passionate about the natural environment and educating landowners on how effective stewardship practices can lighten their impact on the land.


Waterfalls along the Niagara Escarpment

Lower Princess Falls, also known as Princess Falls or Lower Lang's Falls is the second of three waterfalls located on Lang's Creek, which is a Chedoke tributary. This waterfall is located in west Hamilton beside Highway 403 (or the Chedoke Expressway).

Lower Princess Falls consists of several plunge and cascades sections, thus is considered a Complex Ribbon Plunge and Cascade type falls. The crest of this waterfall originates from culvert pipes running under the Chedoke Radial Trail and the bottom terminates into a large concrete box culvert which runs under the highway. The total height is 130 ft. or 39 m. Its crest width is 10 ft. or 3 m however it can widen out substantially more lower down during heavy rainfalls. Lower Princess Falls is considered the second highest waterfall in Hamilton after Tews Falls.

Lower Princess Falls can be viewed from Highway 403 as you drive up the Niagara Escarpment, thus this waterfall is considered the



most viewed falls in Hamilton even though it is dry about half of the time.

Yes, sadly Lower Princess Falls does dry up often and has flow only after rainfalls and after the winter snow melt. Another sad point of this waterfall is that there is no safe location on Highway 403 to stop and photograph it!
