
The Bruce Duncan Memorial Lecture Series

Creating Ecological Improvements within the Red Hill Valley since the Construction of the Red Hill Parkway

with JAMES ROCKWOOD — Environmental Coordinator, Public Works Department, City of Hamilton



The **Red Hill Valley** in Hamilton is named after and home to the Red Hill Creek, which flows from the Niagara Escarpment to Hamilton Harbour, a distance of 7 kilometres. The name comes from the reddish soil, rich with iron. Estimated to be 1,600 acres (650 ha) in size, the Red Hill Valley was the site of a protracted battle over an expressway through the valley, ultimately constructed in 2007.

Construction of the expressway, now known as the **Red Hill Parkway**, was fought by environmentalists for many years. The expressway was proposed as part of a plan to bypass Hamilton and encourage development to the south and east of Hamilton. The valley was chosen for the route of the expressway in the 1970s. The route was chosen over urban routes to avoid destruction of existing neighbourhoods and the resulting land costs.

Following government cancellations and environmental assessments, compromise plans proposed in the 1990s to save the valley were ultimately rejected. The final design did incorporate some compromises intended to ameliorate the effect of the expressway on the valley, including reducing the expressway width to four lanes from six, cleanup of toxic lands along the creek and creek habitat improvement.

James Rockwood holds a Bachelor of Science in Physical Geography and is a certified Environmental Professional specializing in Natural Resource Management and Communications and Public Awareness.

Prior to coming to Hamilton to work on the Red Hill Valley Project, he was a Forester in British Columbia for 14 years. In this context he has extensive experience dealing with professionals of various disciplines and perspectives, Regulatory Agencies, First Nations, Contractors, NGOs and members of the Public on a variety of controversial projects.



James is still fully involved with the Red Hill Project, working on the Integrated Monitoring and Ecological Restoration Programs in and around the valley.


The Literary Rib

The Atlas of Birds

Author - Mike Unwin

Publisher - Princeton University Press, Princeton and Oxford




The Atlas of Birds captures the breathtaking diversity of birds, and illuminates their conservation status around the world. Full colour maps show where birds are found, both by country and terrain. The book reveals how an astounding variety of behavioral adaptations – from flight and feeding to nest building and song – have long enabled them to thrive in virtually every habitat on Earth. Maps of individual journeys and global flyways chart the amazing phenomenon of bird migration, while bird classification is explained using maps for each order and many key families.

Conservation provides a strong focus throughout, with maps illustrating where and why birds are most under threat, and what is being done to protect them. Separate sections examine key factors influencing their distribution and endangering their survival, from deforestation and climate change to invasive species and cage-bird trade. Bird groups most affected, such as island endemics, are highlighted, while a fascinating chapter explores the

complex historical relationship between birds and humans, with maps and data for everything from poultry farming to birdwatching.

Waterfalls along the Niagara Escarpment

Billy Green Falls, also called Battlefield Falls in the past, is located on Battlefield Creek on the west side of Centennial Parkway in the Stoney Creek section of Hamilton. It is located on public lands owned by the City of Hamilton as part of the roadway allowance for Centennial Parkway.

Billy Green Falls is a complex ribbon falls with a height of 17m (56 ft.) and a width of 6m (20 ft.). This is a lovely waterfall which can be seen from the roadway if driving upbound, however Battlefield Creek does dry up and thus the best time to view this waterfall is after a rainfall or during the spring snow melt.

During the War of 1812, Billy Green, whose family lived in this area, scouted the movements of the American troops camped in the area and took this information to the British at Burlington Heights. Knowing the terrain, he then let the British soldiers to the American encampment in Stoney Creek. A short but fierce battle ensued on June 6, 1813 and the Americans retreated, thus preventing the American takeover of this area and possibly Canada.

To reach Billy Green Falls, take Centennial Parkway southbound off the QEW; proceed past King St. at the base of the Niagara Escarpment, and about 2/3rd the way up the escarpment pull off over the rounded curb onto the shoulder beside the second ravine. You should notice a dirt access route for the City of Hamilton crews to maintain Battlefield Creek at this location. Billy Green Falls is about one minute away from the roadway by following this access route.
