The Formation of the Niagara Escarpment

with NICK EYLES — Author, Ontario Rocks, Canada Rocks; advisor and participant with CBC's Geologic Journey and Host of Geologic Journey — World



Nick Eyles, Ph.D (East Anglia), D.Sc. (Leicester) is Professor of Geology at the University of Toronto. His prime research interest is in glacial sedimentology and has many years experience with field work at modern glaciers. He has worked at the universities of Leicester, Newcastle-upon-Tyne and East Anglia in Great Britain; at Memorial University in Newfoundland and has been at Toronto since 1981 when he was awarded a prestigious NSERC University Research Fellowship. He has authored more than 150 publications in leading scientific journals on ice age geology and environmental geology and has conducted geological fieldwork from the Arctic to the Antarctic, including work with the Ocean Drilling Program onboard the drillship Resolution. Recent sabbaticals have been held in Brazil and Australia.

He has edited books on glacial geology ('Glacial Geology: An Introduction for Engineers and Earth Scientists' published by Pergamon), co-edited a book on paleoclimate

('Earth's Glacial Record' published by Cambridge University Press) and urban geology ('Environmental Geology of Urban Areas') published by the Geological Association of Canada.

He is well known for his public outreach activities and the well known 'Rocks' series published by Fitzhenry and Whiteside such as 'Toronto Rocks' (1998 with L. Clinton), 'Ontario Rocks' (2002) and 'Canada Rocks: The Geologic Journey' (2007) (see The Literal Rib further on in this newsletter).with Andrew Miall (Toronto Star 'Science Book of the Year') Two other books 'Canadian Shield – The Rocks that Made Canada' and 'Road Rocks - Geological Wonders of Ontario' will appear shortly. 'Earth Rocks' is in preparation.

Nick was on the road with the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation for seven months in 2009-10 as host of Geologic Journey –World a five part 'Nature of Things' series with David Suzuki. 'Tectonic Europe', 'Along the African Rift', 'Pacific Rim West', 'Pacific Rim: The Americas' and 'Asia: Collision Zone' will begin airing in late October 2010. When not looking at rocks in the field or writing about their history, Nick is an avid adventure motorcyclist and hockey player.



Canada Rocks: The Geologic Journey

For anyone curious about the geological history of our country, *Canada Rocks, The Geologic Journey* is a marvelous portrait of what the authors describe as the incredible 4 billion year "construction project" that gave shape to the continents, mountains, and oceans of planet Earth, and created the world's second largest country - Canada.

Profusely illustrated throughout with full colour and black and white photographs, charts, maps, graphs and sketches, the book explores the country from north to south and from east to west, exploring that incredible history through modern day sites and land shapes created in our distant past.

Read about:

- Rocks in Point Pleasant Park in Halifax that were once part of Morocco, left behind when the Atlantic Ocean came into being.
- Canada's Arctic regions that were formerly part of what today is Siberia. Greenland was once a part of Labrador.
- Fossils in a road cut in Cache Creek, British Columbia that once lived in a sea that covered China.
- The violent collisions of continents and other land masses, the growth and decay of enormous mountain ranges, the impact of meteorites, and the comings and goings of vast ice sheets are explored in fascinating detail, as is the creation of our rocky resources from coal to diamonds.

An essential reference for students and anyone fascinated with the geological forces that created our country, the book includes a great many sites that can be visited for close-up study, making it an invaluable field guide for exploring our history and the world around us.



Waterfalls along the Niagara Escarpment

West Iroquoia Falls, is located on a Chedoke Creek tributary on the Niagara Escarpment side of Hwy 403 in west Hamilton. It is located on public lands owned by the Ministry of Transportation of Ontario (MTO) as part of the Hwy 403 Right-of-Way (ROW). The water originates from a small westerly ravine in the Iroquoia Heights Conservation Area.

West Iroquoia Falls is a terraced ribbon falls with a height of 19.8m (65 ft.) and a normal crest width of 1m (3 ft.) when water is flowing, however it can widen out to 3m (10 ft.) with ice buildup in winter (as seen in attached photo). During much of the year when the vegetation surrounding this waterfall is covered in foliage, this waterfall may not be easily visible from the highway. In addition, West Iroquoia Falls is dry much of the time, thus the best time to view this waterfall is after a rainfall or during the spring snow melt when there is no foliage or during the winter when it is covered in ice.



This waterfall can be seen from the roadway if driving up bound on Hwy 403 from west Hamilton towards Ancaster and is located behind the second rock protection fence about ³/₄ the way along the fence. There is no safe location to stop to view this waterfall from Hwy 403. The photo on the right was taken from the White Chapel Cemetery in west Hamilton using a telephoto lens.

Rib Facts The Niagara Escarpment World Biosphere Reserve

The Directors of the Giant's Rib Discovery Centre form a Committee of the Niagara Escarpment World Biosphere Reserve. Their basic responsibilities are directed to helping ensure that the Niagara Escarpment continues to meet the three basic criteria of a biosphere reserve:

- Contribute to conservation of landscapes, ecosystems, species and genetic variation;
- Foster economic and human development which is socio-culturally and ecologically sustainable;
- Provide support for research, monitoring, education and information exchange related to local national and global issues of conservation and development.

The UNESCO Biosphere Reserve Designation

The biosphere is all of the land, water and atmosphere that support life. A biosphere reserve is an international designation of recognition from UNESCO (the United Nations Educational, Scientific, and Cultural Organization) for an area in the world which is deemed to demonstrate a "balanced relationship between humans and the biosphere".



By this is meant that collaborative efforts among people in the designated area serve to promote the sustainability of local economies and communities, as well as the conservation of the terrestrial/or coastal ecosystems they are in.
