### For the Month of June 2013: Paintings from The Bay to the Escarpment

Featuring the work of artist Paul Duff



Born in Hamilton, Canada, January 15th, 1928, Paul Duff has been painting professionally since 1945. A graduate of McMaster University and Hamilton Teacher's College, he subsidized his career in the visual arts as an itinerant teacher in Switzerland and Brazil.

At age 22, he exhibited with members of Canada's Group of Seven, leading to official recognition by the National Gallery of Canada as a Canadian Painter in August, 1956.

Nineteen years later, he was invited to exhibit at the National Gallery of Brazil in Rio de Janeiro. The next year he became the first Canadian to receive an honorary citizenship to the City of Rio de Janeiro and later inducted as a member of the order of Honorary Cariocas.

Paul Duff returned to Canada in 1981. His paintings appear in public and private collections with representations in Australia, New Zealand, United

Kingdom, Germany, France, Holland, Switzerland, Brazil, Bermuda, the Philippines, China, and the United States. To date he has had ninety-one solo exhibitions on three continents.

In May, 1997, a painting from his Scottish collection was acquired by the National Gallery of Scotland for their permanent collection. About the same time, Paul Duff was conferred a knighthood in the Order of St. Andrew of Jerusalem

He is the author of the book, "The Eternal Apprentice" (1999) used as a text-reference book at the Ontario College of Art and Design, and Sheridan College. In 2009, his autobiography, "My Life, My Art" covering seventy years of his career was published and is available through his gallery (226-974-1928).

This month, the exhibit will feature local birds each placed in their own distinctive and unique nests.


Jim is based in Hamilton and he is a member of the National Taxidermists' Association with over 30 years' experience.





## Waterfalls along the Niagara Escarpment


#### Waterfalls of the Month by Joseph Hollick

**Lower Punchbowl Falls** is located on Stoney Creek, about 100 m below the larger and well known waterfall, Devil's Punch Bowl, in the Stoney Creek section of Hamilton.

Lower Punchbowl Falls is considered an Overhang Classical Falls which does dry up. To view it with water flowing, the best times are after rainfalls and during the winter snow melt. Its height is 6 m (20 ft.) and its width is 6 m (20 ft.).

This waterfall received its name from the curved rock formation upstream, resembling a bowl, where the first waterfall (Devil's Punch Bowl) is located.

Lower Punchbowl Falls is located beside the Bruce Trail and thus can be viewed fairly easily. From QEW, take the Centennial Parkway exit and follow this road for about 3 km to King Street. Turn left towards Stoney Creek and then right onto Mountain Avenue South. Follow this road to the end and there is an entrance to the Bruce Trail at this point which crosses the railway tracks. Follow the Bruce Trail eastward beside Stoney Creek a short distance to Lower Punchbowl Falls.

## Teacher's Corner

The Niagara Peninsula Conservation Authority runs a program for elementary schools in the Niagara Region known as **Canopies for Kids.** It is aimed at planting shade trees in school grounds. The goal of Canopies for Kids is to engage young students and volunteers to learn through hands-on involvement

the benefits that trees provide not only for a healthy environment, but also to recognize the important contribution that trees make to our health.

The science-based programs, adapted for grades 1 to 8, meet the Life Systems Strand of the Ontario curriculum. The program will provide a deeper look at how trees improve biodiversity, water quality and air quality. Studies have shown that shade provided by trees can reduce asthma rates related to poor air quality, contribute to increased physical activity, mood improvement and promote psychological well being, Students will learn about the benefits of trees and forest and how they help our ecological, economic and social environment.

Schools selected to participate in Canopies for Kids will be engaged through interactive school assemblies and workshops provided by NPCA program staff. Staff will work with the school teams on planting and site design incorporating both large and small Niagara tree species. On request, the Conservation Authority will send detailed program information to schools. There is no cost to the schools and a maximum of ten schools per year will be selected for participation.

## **Giant's Rib Photo of the Month**



Have you ever wondered what the marsh area beside Cootes Drive looks like on your way into Dundas from Hamilton? Well this photo shows a portion of it! Just wear waterproof boots if you plan to venture there! The area is teaming with wildlife!

Cootes Paradise was first recognized for its significant wildlife in the 1770s, when Captain Thomas Coote, a British soldier, regularly visited the area to hunt and fish. When the area was first settled in the 1790s, it was called Coote's Paradise.

Local naturalist Charles Durand wrote, in 1818-19, that Cootes Paradise "was a paradise for game of all kinds. Immense flocks of ducks and wildfowl and wild animals innumerable in old times were seen there. It was also the resort of wild fur animals, such as otter, perhaps beaver, fisher, minks and especially muskrats; snakes were abundant there of all kinds".
