
Board Positions Open In the News

So as a throwback tribute to our retiring friends, here are their bios from our first newsletter season in 2007.




EXECUTIVE PROFILE - Joseph Hollick as appeared March 2007

Joe was born in Hamilton in 1945, but has lived for the last 22 years in Dundas with his wife, Marilyn. They have two grown daughters and two grand-daughters. Joe, a professional Engineer, earned his Bachelor's Degree in Civil Engineering from MacMaster University, and a Master's in Environemtal Engineering from the University of Western Ontario.

He retired over a year ago after 31 year's with the City of Burlington's Engineering Department, where he overlooked the construction of over 500 projects, including Burlington's waterfront, LaSalle Pavilion, fire stations, pools, ice rinks, libraries,

community centres, Joseph Brant Museum, Ireland House Museum, and many major road and bridge reconstruction projects. After retiring, Joe became a Director of the Burlington Museum Board, and of the Giant's Rib Discovery Centre. He is part of a waterfall group, which includes the Hamilton Conservation Authority, the City of Hamilton, Tourism Hamilton, Hamilton Naturalists Club, the Bruce Trail Association - Bruce Trail Iroquoia section, and waterfall enthusiasts that meets several times a year to continually update Hamilton's waterfalls, work on access to the falls and increase their tourism potential.

One of his hobbies is locating every waterfall in Hamilton and photographing each one several times during the different seasons. He is also the creator of the "Waterfalls of Hamilton Seasons" and "Waterfalls of Hamilton Seasons" poster series, which earned the 2004 Hamilton Tourism Award for the category of 'New Tourism Idea". Joe has been an avid curler for 45 years, and just finished volunteering as a driver during the recent Tim Horton's Brier at Copps Coliseum.




DIRECTOR PROFILE - Stan Nowak as appeared in April 2007

Stan serves as Publicity & Communications Chair for the Giant's Rib Discovery Centre (now the Dundas Valley Escarpment Centre), and is also the Chair of the Hamilton-Wentworth Stewardship Council. He is also a cofounder and the current President of the Dundas Valley Historical Society He is an enthusiastic community activist, with an avid interest in local natural and cultural history. He also volunteers with the Dundas Cactus Festival Parade, with the Dundas Museum, and sits on the Knowles Bequest Board.

Stan's community activities recently earned him the 2006 Vocational Award from the Rotary Club of Dundas and a Volunteer Recognition Award from the Ontario Ministry of Natural Resources. Stan and his wife Sally both work for Scotiabank's Ontario Central Accounting Unit in Hamilton and have lived in Dundas since 1999.



The GREEN Waterfall of the Month for October 2015 is Lower Snake Falls.

Lower Snake Falls is a Complex Cascade with flow after a rainfall or during the winter snow melt. It is located on a tributary of the Grindstone Creek with a height of 5m to 6 m. and a width that varies from 1m to 3m depending on flow.

It is located in Burlington, just outside the boundary of the Waterdown section of Hamilton.

To visit Lower Snake Falls, exit Hwy 403 onto Hwy #6 North (towards Guelph) and travel approximately 3 km to Hwy #5. Turn right onto #5 and when in the village of Waterdown, turn right onto Mill St. Immediately after passing under a railway bridge, turn right into the parking lot for the Smokey Hollow area. Then follow the Bruce Trail down the Grindstone Creek for about 10 – 15 minutes to where a small tributary flows into the Grindstone Creek. The lower section of this tributary is Lower Snake Falls.
